Suddenly a lump came my throat and I felt bad for thinking it was about one thing and infact, he was facing a terrible time in his life. I remember crying trying to tell my Dad to pray for him. I kept the letter and read it over and over. I would take it to work and re-read and started a prayer chain. I email many friends of mine in the hunting industry and said, please drop him a note and pray for him. I had heard back from a number of folks who were pro hunters who send e-mails and cards. It touched Kip and his family and I was moved. The power of prayer is the ultimate place you can lay a burden and watch the Lord take over.

Cindy began to send weekly updates on Kip until it got to hard to keep up. She gracefully said it was all life changing and would give God the glory each letter she wrote.

Holding back tears, I said here's some more work for you. That was all I had to see. My eyes filled with tears as I stood there in appreciation of him and his wife. I completely felt a peace come over me like I have never felt. I took a picture of Kip at his station working and he laughed and said his hair was coming back slowly. I thanked them and got in my car and cried all the way home. Time is precious and I had new friends and new hope. I thank the Lord for Kip and his family. This story is for my friend who stands taller than anyone I know and who will never know how much his patience and faith has blessed my life. Who would have ever guessed that within 6 months.
